Summer is still here in August, and we are waiting for some relief from the heat. Projects that require a lot of physical effort need to start early and be finished by noon, if at all possible. We have a couple of horses that have COPD and by this point in the summer, they are having problems with shortness of breath, since heat and high humidity aggravate their condition. Due to the generosity of Dr. Kim Glass and his wife Elizabeth, who have donated a nebulizer for horses as well as medication, we have a much better treatment for these horses, and thiis summer they are much better off.





We came close to losing Dude last summer. He was having a very difficult time breathing, lost a drastic amount of weight, and was not at all living his best life. With early interventions now and a better treatment regimen, he still has some bad days, but his weight is holding and even his bad days are not as severe as in the past.

We had a small but dedicated crew last Saturday to load 170 square bales into the hay loft. Everyone knew their jobs and we got the mission accomplished before noon. This filled our hay loft about halfway, and we will get another load done by the end of the month. That will pretty well take care of our square bale needs for the winter. A huge shout out to Jim Fuller "Farms for helping us acquire our hay, and for letting us store round bales on their property. With 70+ horses under our care at our "home base" as well as other properties where they are fostered, this is a huge job and very much appreciated.

Amy Skinner Horsemanship is one of those Facebook pages that is a go-to for me. I watch for new posts daily and love her saging. Here are two recent posts I particularly liked.

Posted on Facebook August 8, 2024:

We live in a tips and tricks world, so much so that dedication to riding as art is dying.

You can piecework together bits and pieces, a cobbled up game that'll get you down the road. An exercise to teach steering, another loading, a cue for the canter, a target for trimming- a horse becomes a dancing bear, and a rider moves through a robotic routine half asleep.



Few have the patience or great love for riding as an art form- to see and study and know a horse, to learn to really ride - to spend hours learning to handle the whip with refinement, to handle the reins like a paintbrush and paint a picture with your body on a horse canvas. This takes years, thousands of hours, and absolute dedication to a craft. There are no tips, no tricks, just pure practice and commitment, and an open heart and mind.

Good riding requires that we re wire our natural instincts. When we get afraid, we tip forward, or clutch, or pull. We stop breathing, and somewhere deep down we hope the horse will adapt and take care of us. But a good steward takes responsibility: it is our duty to practice honing our reflexes. It is our job to practice controlling our position, our breath, and learning to create a productive mindset.

It is the hardest thing in the world to do to control our natural instincts- but it is the most important. And expecting the horse to adjust to us without the necessary skills is folly. Take the time, put the hours in, get a good coach and an appropriate horse, and master your body and mind.
